Animal Health Requirements For Admission to New York State and County Fairs

(Part 351 of NYS Agriculture and Markets Regulations)

Important changes:

- All cattle and swine must be identified by USDA approved official ear tag.
- RABIES VACCINATION LOWER AGE LIMIT IS 4 MONTHS
- Category 2 veterinary accreditation is now required.
- GoPass is now available for horse movements.

General Prohibitions and Requirements

- □ No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- □ No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian or an authorized agent.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to or require removal from the fair premises, or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of or exposed to any infectious, contagious or communicable disease.

Note: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.

□ All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

- □ Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, deer, monkeys, misc. ruminants, camels and elephants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- **The CVI must be issued by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian.**
- □ All animals must be uniquely identified. All manmade ID must be recorded. Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- □ Only one species is allowed per certificate.
- **The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.**

New York Origin Livestock:

- □ A valid intrastate CVI (AI 61) is required.
- **□** Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI (see below).
- **The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.**

Out of State Origin Livestock:

- □ All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- □ The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a fair must be within 30 days of the initial CVI inspection. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a state official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

Animal Identification

Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, and deer/elk must be identified by USDA approved official identification. Cattle, swine and deer/elk must be identified by official ear tag. Sheep and goats must be identified by official scrapie identification (see sheep and goat sections below). Llamas and alpacas can be identified by ear tag or microchip approved by the Department of Agriculture and Markets. A sketch or photograph signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian is also acceptable identification for llamas and alpacas. Misc. ruminants must be identified by Department of Agriculture and Markets approved identification.

Rabies Vaccination

- □ Rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are 4 months of age or older on the date of admission to the fair.
- □ Vaccine must have been administered within the past 12 months. The exception is Imrab LA vaccine used in sheep which protects for 3 years after the second annual vaccination (consult your veterinarian).
- □ The rabies vaccination requirement must be met on the day of admission even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.
- NOTE: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors. The New York State Fair requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- □ Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the veterinarian administering the vaccine or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration and the duration of immunity if longer than one year.
- □ If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on an EIA test record, it must be signed separately in addition to the required EIA test record signature.
- □ NOTE: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.

BVD-PI Testing

□ All cattle, llamas and alpacas exhibited at NY county fairs or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is

responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

Cattle Testing:

- Currently acceptable BVD tests for cattle <u>less than 61 days old</u>:
 - Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
 - \circ whole blood virus isolation
 - whole blood PCR
- Currently acceptable BVD tests for cattle <u>61 days of age and older</u>:
 - Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
 - Serum or milk Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE)
 - Whole blood virus isolation
 - Whole blood, serum or plasma PCR

Note: The NYS Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at Cornell University can conduct PCR testing on pools of up to 10 cattle.

Cleaning and Disinfection

All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).

Kidding and Lambing

- Due to the concern about the spread of scrapie, any sheep or goats that are exhibited at a county fair that have recently given birth or have a vaginal discharge, will be ordered removed along with their offspring.
- □ The causative agent for scrapie may be present in high concentration in fluids associated with birth and the risk of transmission is considered highest at that time.

Commingling of Sheep and Cattle

Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.

Commingling of Swine and Poultry

Due to the potential spread of influenza viruses it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations.

Isolation on Returning Home

□ The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin. If any illness is noted in the exhibition animals the owner should contact their veterinarian immediately.

Individual Species Requirements

Cattle

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above).
- **D** Rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 4 months of age or older (see above).

- □ All cattle must be must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). (See current acceptable tests above.) The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- □ All cattle must be vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with a product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for these diseases for the duration of the fair.

Sheep

- □ Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible USDA approved flock tattoo and individual animal ID number or 3) electronic ID if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.
- **D** Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 4 months of age or older (see above).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- □ If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Goats

- □ Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible registration tattoo or 3) a legible USDA approved herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic ID if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic ID is recorded on the goats registration paper. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- □ If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Swine

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above). **Poultry**
 - Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition OR 2) proof that the birds originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.
 - **D** Pullorum test negative poultry must be identified by official leg band.
 - □ Proof of NPIP status must be in the form of an NPIP certificate or purchase receipt containing NPIP certification information.

DAIRY AND LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS

GENERAL RULES:

- A. All livestock must be owned or leased and cared for by exhibitors since June 15 of the current year.
- **B.** Exhibitors must submit evidence of ownership or leasing (4-H Program Animal Identification Form on file in the 4-H Department at the Extension Education Center office by June 15) of all animals entered in the 4-H classes.
- **C.** 4-H exhibitors must make advance entries in order to be sure of barn space. All dairy and livestock entries must be received by the Cooperative Extension office by August 1.
- **D.** IMPORTANT: All Dairy and Livestock exhibited in this department must meet the required health standards as determined by the NEW YORK STATE Department of Agriculture and Markets. (See Livestock Health Requirements above). EACH ANIMAL MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY A HEALTH CERTIFICATE.
- E. Animals may be brought to the exhibit areas on Tuesday afternoon and evening. All animals must be in place by 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, September 2. Health check procedures will be announced at a later date. Exhibits may not be taken from the display until MONDAY (9-9:30 p.m.) and TUESDAY (8:30-10:30 a.m. and 4-6:30 p.m.), except large animal exhibits (beef and dairy cattle, goats, sheep and swine) which may leave after 6 p.m. Monday evening and rabbit, cavy and poultry exhibits which may leave after 9 p.m. Monday evening.
- **F.** All animals entered in 4-H Classes are required to be housed in the 4-H Dairy and Livestock areas. These areas to be designated by the 4-H Superintendent.
- **G.** All 4-H members are urged to enter animals in the open show. For entry information contact Angelo Nero, P.O. Box 257, Chatham, NY 12037.
- **H.** 4-H members entering animals in the open show, and housing them in the 4-H area, are requested to indicate that they will be housed in the 4-H area when the open show entry is made.
- **I.** Exhibitors staying overnight on the fairgrounds must have a parent's written permission and an adult chaperone age 21 or older. (See General Rule Letter "S", page 5).
- **J.** All animals must be shown in the show ring and must be shown by the exhibitor. Any exceptions must be approved by the Superintendent and 4-H Educator.
- **K.** ALL 4-H animals on the fairgrounds must be cleaned and fed daily. Exhibit areas, pens, cages must be cleaned each day prior to 9:30 AM. It is required in order to receive your premium monies that your animal(s) exhibit is clean and presentable when fair-goers are in attendance. Animals may **not** be removed before the published release time and may result in loss of premium and/or ineligibility for future fair participation.
- L. 4-H Animals are not to be on the midway, near food concessions, or in any public area **not designated for animals**. Animals should be in their appropriate exhibit building, or the show ring, or taking part in a 4-H event or activity. Public Health and Biosecurity concerns prohibit animals from being taken around the fairgrounds.
- M. Master Livestock Showperson Contest A contest will be held to determine the Master Livestock Showperson from the dairy and livestock divisions. Entry is limited to the First place Master Showperson in Beef, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goat, Sheep and Swine. Second place Master Showperson will be considered only if the First place Master Showperson is ineligible to compete in the Master Livestock Showperson Contest. Each participant will show an animal of each species listed and be judged on their ability to effectively show each

type of animal. Judging will be based on a maximum of 50 points total with the Master Livestock Showperson being the highest scoring individual overall. **Appropriate dress** is: clean 4-H t-shirt or dress shirt, jeans, and heavy shoes appropriate for handling cattle. Once a member has won this contest, they are no longer eligible to participate. They are, however, required to participate in advanced showmanship for the animals they are exhibiting.

- N. Market Animals All species entered in 4-H market classes are required to sell in the 4-H Livestock Auction on Monday. Exhibitors are responsible for obtaining a seller's packet from the Cooperative Extension Office and securing interest from at least one buyer **per animal** for the sale. Seller must be present at sale. Please call the CCE office if you have any questions. See Department 432 for Livestock Sale requirements.
 - **0.** Class Size and Safety Classes for any animal show can be divided if the number of animals warrants that move. The decision about when and how this will be done will be made by the staff person in charge and the judge of that class.

Department 422. CAVY

RULES:

- A. Cavies will be brought to the 4-H Small Animal Exhibit in the Poultry Building at the fairgrounds on *Tuesday between 3 and 8PM. All cavies will be visually inspected before cooping.* Any cavy found with ear canker or other contagious diseases will be disqualified and must be removed immediately. Questionable animals may be isolated and checked by the state vet on Thursday morning.
- B. OWNERSHIP—Cavies must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor since June 15 of the current year. All cavies must have an identifier on tape or via permanent black marker in the right ear. Ear I.D. and 4-H Program Animal Identification forms will be checked upon entry.
- C. BARN DUTY Each exhibitor is required to complete two barn duty shifts. Barn duty information and health check schedule will be sent directly to exhibitors in August. All cleaning must be done before 9:30AM.
- D. Exhibitors must show their own cavies. Cavies will not be judged unless the exhibitor is present. If the exhibitor needs help he/she is to ask another 4-H member. A maximum of two entries may be made in a class.
- E. Substitutions can only be made in the same class (breed, gender) with a registered project animal.
- F. If five or more entries of a particular breed are entered in a class, additional breed classes may be added at the discretion of the show coordinator and 4-H Educator.
- G. Cavies that do not meet breed standards will be awarded a green ribbon in Section 2. (See Standard of Perfection.)
- H. No pregnant females and no sows with litters.
- I. All exhibitors must participate in showmanship (Section 1).
- J. Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to bring locks for their cages to ensure animal safety.
- K. Showmanship attire recommendations: long-sleeved white shirt, lab coats work well.
- L. Exhibitors must fill out a double-sided entry tag for each cavy they are exhibiting and for their showmanship class. **Please have this completed before the show.**

- M. Appropriate carrier cages are needed for Show Day. Animals will be transported to the Livestock Show Ring. Members are strongly encouraged to bring "travel chairs" as well.
- N. 4-H Exhibits are educational, therefore there will be **no** advertising of animals for sale. Any sale transactions are private, and any exchange of animals must take place at the end of the fair. The Livestock Sale is the exception to this rule and animals are only sold during the 4-H livestock sale.
- O. Release time for this department is 9PM on Labor Day. Cavies may also be picked-up on Tuesday morning between 8:30 and 10:30AM fill out request form during Health Check.

DEPARTMENT 423. RABBIT

RULES:

- A. Rabbits will be brought to the 4-H Small Animal Exhibit in the Poultry Building at the fairgrounds on *Tuesday between 3 and 8PM. No other Rabbits or Cavy will be accepted. All rabbits will be visually inspected before cooping.* Any rabbit found with ear canker or other contagious diseases will be disqualified and must be removed immediately. Questionable animals may be isolated and checked by the state vet on Thursday morning.
- B. OWNERSHIP—Rabbits must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor since June 1 of the current year. All rabbits must be tattooed in the left ear or marked with permanent black marker in the left ear. Ear I.D. and 4-H Program Animal Identification forms will be checked upon entry.

- C. BARN DUTY Each exhibitor is required to complete two barn duty shifts. Barn duty information and health check schedule will be sent directly to exhibitors in August. All cleaning must be done before 9:30AM.
- D. Exhibitors must show their own rabbits. Rabbits will not be judged unless the exhibitor is present. If the exhibitor needs help he/she is to ask another 4-H member. A maximum of two entries may be made in a class except for Doe & Litter where only one entry may be made. For example two junior buck, 2 senior buck and so on.
- E. Substitutions can only be made in the same class (breed, gender) with a registered project animal.
- F. If five or more entries of a particular breed are entered in a class, additional breed classes may be added at the discretion of the show coordinator and 4-H Educator.
- G. Rabbits that do not meet breed standards will be awarded a green ribbon in Sections 2-10. (See Standard of Perfection.)
- H. No pregnant females and no animals over 5 years old may be entered.
- I. All exhibitors must participate in showmanship (Section 1).

J. Exhibitors are required to drop off extra locks or keys for cages upon animal check in to ensure animal safety.

- K. Showmanship attire recommendations: long-sleeved white shirt, lab coats work well.
- L. Doe and Litter Class Litter must be a minimum of 4 weeks old. Entries may be limited due to cage availability.
- M. Appropriate carrier cages are needed for Show Day. Animals will be transported to the Livestock Show Ring. Members are strongly encouraged to bring "travel chairs" as well.
- N. 4-H Exhibits are educational, therefore there will be **no** advertising of animals for sale. Any sale transactions are private, and any exchange of animals must take place at the end of the fair. The Livestock Sale is the exception to this rule and animals are only sold during the 4-H livestock sale.
- O. Release time for this department is 9PM on Labor Day. Rabbits may also be picked-up on Tuesday morning between 8:30 and 10:30AM fill out request form during Health Check.
- P. Rabbits need to be a minimum of 12 weeks in order to show.

MARKET RABBIT CLASSES Section 31

RULES:

- A. Rabbits must meet class, age and weight requirements. See Department 432 for general livestock sale rules.
- B. Rabbits will be weighed in the presence of the judge during the rabbit sale class judging.
- C. The judging will rank the animals, and the Grand Champion will be the first selection, the Reserve Champion will be the next eligible animal. The remaining positions will be selected from the remaining eligible animals. The Meat Pen is its own special placing and is guaranteed a third position. In the case of no Meat Pen, there will be a Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, and the other placings from the remaining eligible animals.
- D. Rabbits must be permanently tattooed.
- E. Fryers, Roasters and stewers must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor since June 15th of the project year.
- F. No more than eight entries per exhibitor may be entered in the MARKET RABBIT CLASSES.
- G. Rabbits will sell per unit.
- H. The exhibitor winning the Meat Pen class has the right to turn it down if they have also won Grand Champion or Reserve Champion.
- I. Market Rabbit Entries will be required to sell in the 4-H Livestock Sale on Monday.

CLASS NO.

- 1. SINGLE FRYER: Under 10 weeks old, must weigh 3.5 lbs. but not exceed 5.5 lbs.

DEPARTMENT 424: POULTRY

4-H LIVESTOCK SALE Department 432

Rules:

- 1. Animals for the sale must be listed on the 4-H Voucher Entry-Blank and postmarked on or before the date those forms are due. All animals for the sale must be entered in the appropriate 4-H Market Class to be eligible.
- 2. All members offering animals in the sale must recruit at least one bidder per animal. Member must be present at sale to present their animal.
- 3. All sale animals must meet a well-finished weight standard which may be at the discretion of the judge of their respective 4-H market class in order to be eligible. Weigh-in will be scheduled by the 4-H Livestock Sale Coordinator. Members will need to be present or send a representation to sign off on the recorded weight.
- 4. The order of sale is based upon the animal's placement in the market class.
- 5. The 4-H Livestock Advisory Committees reserve the right to accept or reject any animals at their discretion. The decisions of this committee is final. Only top quality animals will be offered for sale.
- 6. A 5% commission on the initial sale price of each animal sold may be deducted from the sale price. Proceeds from the resale or subsequent resales of livestock sold is designated to the 4-H Livestock Sale Committee funds. Any other arrangements must be **pre-approved** by Cornell Cooperative Extension of Columbia-Greene Counties.
- 7. Once an animal is sold it becomes the sole responsibility of the buyer. Columbia-Greene 4-H and Cornell Cooperative Extension cannot be held responsible.
- 8. All 4-H sellers must be available to pick up and deliver meat when needed.
- 9. All entries will follow market class guidelines. In addition, the sale requirements for each species are:
- Market Steers Must weigh at least 1,000 lbs.
- Market Hogs Must weigh at least 200 lbs. and no more than 300.
- Market Lambs Must weigh at least 85 lbs. and no more than 150 lbs.
- Market Goats Limit of 4 goats. Must weigh at least 20 lbs.
- Market Rabbits Limit of 7 units. See market classes for specific weight requirements.
- Market Poultry Includes chickens. Limit of 8, two per exhibitor.
